Several of our own Mission Staff share stories of their work around the world:

Live in harmony with one another — Romans 12:16

A group of Muslim youths stormed into the PCEA Kisauni Church in Mombasa, Kenya on August 18, 2012 bent on revenge. A Muslim cleric had been killed the previous day, and the group of youths alleged that he had been killed by the police. Consequently, they retaliated by burning and looting businesses and churches in the area. The damage to the Kisauni Church was extensive. All 300 chairs were burnt, the music equipment stolen, the pulpit destroyed, and the inside of the church completely blackened by smoke. The manse was also broken into by the crowd as they looked for the parish minister to kill him.

Reconstruction and reconciliation began the following Sunday as Muslim leaders and a local member of Parliament (also a Muslim) came to the service and apologized on behalf of the Muslim youths. The Parliament member and his group made a large monetary donation while other leaders contributed items like paint. Members of the congregation held a fund drive to help with repairs. The Outreach Foundation gave the church a new roof. The ladies group raised funds to tile the badly damaged floor. The church is now more beautiful than before. We thank Almighty God, the members of the church and all our donors for walking with us during that trying moment. May God bless you all.

For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline. — 2 Timothy 1:7

A cup of coffee shared together on a January afternoon in an outdoor café is not that remarkable....unless you happen to be doing it in Damascus and to the not-so-distant sound of artillery rounds. Julie Burgess, from Omaha partner church West Hills, and the Rev. Marshall Zieman, Outreach trustee, along with a dozen fellow Presbyterians from The Outreach Foundation and PC(USA), Sweden and Switzerland, had ventured to Syria at the invitation of the Presbyterian Church there. Our journey had begun a week earlier in Lebanon where we had been in a consultation for four days with the leadership of the National Evangelical Church of Syria and Lebanon (our Presbyterian partners in the region), receiving updates of their work in assisting church families and pastors in war-torn Syria. The Outreach Foundation has come alongside that ministry for the past two years. Seven of the ten pastors serving in Syria were with us, and their stories were powerful: serving in towns which are temporarily secured by the army but surrounded by hostile insurgencies; visiting members who have had to flee their city and are now hunkered down in obscure mountain villages; encouraging families to stay in Syria whose homes had been demolished by falling mortars. Food and power shortages, sky-rocketing inflation, kidnappings, disrupted schools, and destroyed livelihoods filled in the blanks. We had arrived in Damascus with a sobering sense of the context....

That Saturday evening – and for a large chunk of Sunday – we worshiped and fellowshipped with the Presbyterian congregation in Damascus. It was at their invitation that we had come. The Rev. Boutros Zaour, the pastor there for 17 years, was integral in helping to coordinate all the complexities of such a visit into such a place at such a time. His congregation of 350 has nearly doubled in size, having received Presbyterian families displaced from other parts of the country. Our friends and families here credit us with a great deal of bravery for making this journey. I tell them that the Church there made us brave, carrying on, as they do, the call of the Church to be salt and light: loving and reconciling, encouraging one another in difficult times, and bearing one another's burdens. We needed to be brave for three days. They need to live bravely, day in and day out. But then again, God did not give any of us a spirit of fear and timidity, right?

Do not cast me off in the time of old age; forsake me not when my strength is spent. — Psalm 71:9

More than 140 million Chinese, 11% of the population, are more than 60 years old. The number is expected to nearly double by 2020. Anticipating the challenges brought by this aging population, the Church in China is positioning herself to help these members and extend the Kingdom at the same time.

One local Christian council (our equivalent of presbyteries) is helping its senior citizens, and its good works have blessed the community. In an area that had been known as 'not so friendly' toward Christians, it established a senior citizens' home almost fifteen years ago. The facility has been well-managed and praised by the community. The council then proposed to the government expanding the facility to offer a hospice program and to mobilize Christian physicians from its congregations to ensure that a physician would always be available. The local government requested that these physicians be made available to the community as well. The council agreed and requested permission to build a chapel within the senior citizens' home to help address the spiritual needs of the patients. The local government approved the plan. The chapel is now completed and has 1,000 seats to accommodate more than just the nursing home residents. The doors are open to the local community.

The government then encouraged the Christian council to submit a plan for a rehab hospital. After much prayer and consideration, the council submitted the plan which was approved. An Outreach church partner was connected with the local Christian council to assist with the purchase of equipment for the facility. Joyfully, the first Christian hospital established by the Church in China since 1949 is now serving patients. One of the priorities of The Outreach Foundation is to build the capacity of the global church for its witness. This new partnership in China is making an impact in the health of Chinese people and in the way in which the church is viewed by the wider society. Thanks be to God!

Did you Know?

The Christian majority world doesn't look like it used to. In 1910, the Global North (North America, Europe, Japan, Australia, New Zealand) comprised 82% of all Christians, while the Global South had 18%. One hundred years later, the Global North had just 39% of all Christians, while the Global South had grown to 61% – a significant reversal.

In terms of characteristics, Christianity is now primarily a non-white, non-Western, non-wealthy religion.

Africa will be the most Christian continent on earth by 2025.

Christian missionaries are being sent to North America in record numbers. The Redeemed Christian Church in Nigeria has planted five hundred churches across North America.

About 90% of Christians live in countries where Christians are in the majority; only about 10% of Christians worldwide live as minorities.

Cuba: May 3 - 10

Come meet the Presbyterian Reformed Church in Cuba! Led by Marilyn Borst, we will stay mainly in Matanzas, where the Evangelical Theological Seminary will host us, but we will also spend several nights in Havana. Along the way we will be learning from church leaders and visiting congregations of the Presbyterian Reformed Church in Cuba. This trip is intended to encourage pastors and mission leaders to explore the possibility of developing a new mission partnership for their congregation in Cuba.

Mozambique: May 12 - 22

For more than a decade, The Outreach Foundation has helped to facilitate a creative holistic evangelism project in Tete Province that demonstrates God's love through churches, schools, clinics, water projects, leader training, and much more. Nearly seventy congregations have been established. Trip leaders will be project director Rev. Nedson Zulu, public health nurse Sebber Banda, and Outreach trustee Berry Long.

Holy Land: August 29 - September 10

On this trip we will be hosted by our partner, Bethlehem Bible College, which seeks to train and prepare Christian servant-leaders for the churches and society within an Arab context. We'll serve the college in one of its ministries, meet with other Palestinian Christian ministries, and visit important places from Christ's life and ministry. Marilyn Borst and Rob Weingartner will lead this trip.

Kenya: October 17 - 30

This work trip for women will come alongside the Presbyterian Church in East Africa to work with PCEA women to finish and landscape a new church building near Nairobi. We will also conduct an eyeglass clinic to fit people with glasses. After a full work week, we'll join with the congregation in their exuberant dedication of this new place of worship before heading out for a brief, breathtaking wildlife safari.

Africa: Emerging Leaders/Pastors – October 20 – November 1

Outreach trustee Rev. Enock DeAssis and Executive Director Rob Weingartner will lead a group of younger pastors to experience the faith and faithfulness of African Christians who have much to teach us about pastoral vocation and missional calling. Seeing how the gospel has taken root in the African context will help participants to see their own ministry in creative, new ways.

China: October 20 - November 2

This discovery trip will focus on the rich history of Presbyterian involvement in Kingdom work there. In this country where the church today is growing in unparalleled ways, we will meet with partners to discern how God's Spirit has worked in the past and is working today through a dynamic and vital church. Peter Lim, China Mission Specialist, will lead this trip.

Egypt: November 7 - 17

Come celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Evangelical Theological Seminary of Cairo, which is training the next generation of leaders for the 400+ Presbyterian churches in Egypt and beyond. Egypt is a land with a long, grand and diverse history; this history includes the amazing stories of God's church. We will also visit new church developments in the 'suburbs' and 'satellite cities' around Cairo, meet current and future church leaders, and be inspired by the church's bold and progressive mission vision even as our presence there will encourage local Christians.

Lebanon and Syria: November 16 – 25

The National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon, the extension of our Presbyterian family in the region, is based in Beirut which will be our base, as well. This visit of solidarity provides opportunity for congregations and individuals who have supported the Syria Relief Appeal through The Outreach Foundation to experience the situation firsthand and to learn from Synod leaders.
