enerally, when you think of a VBS fundraiser, bake sales and lemonade stands raising several hundred dollars likely come to mind. That's not the case with the Christian Arabic Church in Richmond, Virginia, a new church development with the Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians (ECO).

The 128 member church, made up of immigrants and refugees from the Middle East, decided to conduct a fundraiser during their August VBS program. After prayer and hearing about The Outreach Foundation's Iraq Relief Appeal at the ECO Synod meeting in Dallas, they decided to help displaced Christian brothers and sisters in Iraq due to ISIS' takeover of Mosul. You see, many of the families of the 74 VBS students had also endured religious persecution in their countries. After coming to the U.S., they were free to worship Jesus without fear of violence and even death. One family was from Iraq, and their relatives were caught up in the violence in Mosul. It was an easy decision to focus efforts on helping the displaced Christians in Iraq.

Besides the usual crafts, games, drama, songs and storytelling (and of course snacks), raising money for Iraq relief was on their minds. For four days, they did everything

possible to raise money, including competitions among themselves, parents matching what the children raised, head shaving and pies in the face if certain goals were reached, even emptying their own piggybanks. Eight year old Merola was an inspiration to the group. She had been saving for several years in her "bank," which was a repurposed mixed nuts can. She brought her bank and, sacrificially, handed it over to church pastor Fakhri Yacoub, "giving it all" as she said.

On Friday, everyone was in suspense as Pastor Yacoub counted up the checks, wadded bills and assorted coins. To everyone's amazement, more than \$4,000 had been raised! But, it's difficult to stop a moving train - the children weren't finished even though VBS was. By Sunday at their evening worship, the total came to \$5,000. The entire congregation was joyful in sending this gift to The Outreach Foundation, destined to the vulnerable church in Iraq.

# Showing Up in Dark Places

November, I, along with Rev. Dr. Nuhad Tomeh, The Outreach Foundation's Consultant for the Middle East, brought a group of seven into western Syria. We visited Homs, Amr Hosn, Yazdia, Fairouzeh and Lattakia – all with a faithful presence of a Presbyterian Church. We worshipped and cried together, we heard their stories of loss and were awed by their resolve to continue in their work and witness. As we climbed into bed in Homs, we could hear the mortars and rapid fire in a part of the city not yet freed of the violence. By day, we walked through the apocalyptic destruction in the older parts of that city where churches are in ruin (and many mosques, too) and were embraced by the Orthodox and Catholic communities for whom our presence was as encouraging as it was for our Presbyterians there.

Most amazingly, the greatest determination to remain is found not in the older ones who have no place else to go, but in the beautiful, vibrant young adults whose presence can only embody the Hope which still preserves and protects His Bride, against whom the gates of hell will not prevail. What an honor to stand with them for a tiny slice of their epic struggle and be The Outreach Foundation.

## The Harvest is Plentiful

An excerpt from a recent news update sent by Dustin Ellington, professor at Justo Mwale Theological University in Zambia. Dustin and his wife, Sherri, are mission co-workers in Lusaka, where Dustin helps train pastors for the Zambian church.


umerous people in Africa yearn to be trained for a life of ministry; it is not difficult to find good candidates for this training. Justo Mwale trains pastors from denominations throughout Southern Africa. However, these churches are not able to send a student unless a partner church body or individual chooses to offer a scholarship. Justo Mwale could train far more pastors than we currently do, and there is need for far more pastors in this part of the world. It is not unusual, for instance, for our students from Malawi to serve as many as 7,500 persons – as a solo pastor. There is no risk at all that a student will be trained and no position will be available for him or her. "The harvest is plentiful" here in Southern Africa.

One such person is Dora Longwe, who is preparing for ministry with the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian and has just finished her third year of training. She once shared that on the day she was accepted to be a student at Justo Mwale, she was absolutely delighted. On the very same day, her twin sister, Doreen, was offered a very good job with Zambia's Ministry of Education. The family immediately threw a celebration right on the spot. At one point while they were celebrating another sibling, a younger sister, said to her, "I know why we are celebrating for Doreen, because she will have a salary. But you're preparing for ministry and may get no salary at all. So why are we celebrating?" When Dora heard the question, she answered her sister with a song, a song repeating these words: "I'd rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God..." Dora shared with her sister that the joy of being in God's presence while giving her life to the ministry of the gospel was all the pay that she required. Dora said she went on singing that song to herself throughout the day, as a way of expressing the joy she knew. For me, Dora's response embodies our students' wholehearted love for ministry and commitment to it.

When you support a scholarship fund such as this, you help train someone like Dora for a church that is very hungry to grow in Christ and spread the gospel. And when a new scholarship is funded, it is a real encouragement to our African Presbyterian partners.
