

Our Family in Syria and Lebanon

Ed. Note: An Outreach team of 10 recently returned from a 14 day trip to Lebanon and Syria. They visited some of the 18 Presbyterian churches in Syria, meeting with pastors and church members. Outreach Executive Director Rob Weingartner, who traveled with the team, shares his thoughts below about the moving experience.

everywhere we went in Syria we were warmly welcomed, by shopkeepers and soldiers, patriarchs and porters, governors and grandmothers. And the Presbyterian churches? They welcomed us like family. In fact, we discovered that we had brothers and sisters whom most of us had never met.

During our nine days in Syria, The Outreach Foundation team received humbling thanks for our prayers and the support that we have sent for the churches' relief efforts. We received the thanks on your behalf, all of you in the Outreach family who have been praying and giving so generously. Many of you were also praying for our team. Thank you.

With fighting continuing in many parts of the country and half the population displaced, tremendous challenges remain. Nevertheless, it is the strategy of our partner, the National Evangelical Synod of

Syria and Lebanon, to help people stay, to keep the churches open, to care for those whose lives have been shattered, both Christian and non-Christian, to preserve a witness to the Gospel in a place where many have lost hope and long for good news.

Paul makes it clear in Colossians 1 that bearing fruit and bearing burdens go together. Why did we go to Syria? To be with members of our family who are suffering. Nothing can take the place of just showing up. How we were inspired and humbled by their faith and their faithfulness!

We worshipped on successive Sundays in Latakia and Damascus, met with government leaders in Latakia and Homs, prayed and sang and wept with family in many of the Syrian Presbyterian churches, and we listened. Mostly, we listened.

At Yazdieh, where pastor Michel and his wife

Houda are serving in beautiful ways – their hands strengthened by your gifts – we listened to the stories of many who had been driven from Homs. 2,000 hurting families have been helped by this small congregation. "If there are angels on earth," one woman said, "this church is the angel." Across the country Syrian Presbyterian congregations are saying, "Do not be afraid; for we bring you good news."

How sobering it was to visit the church in Mhardeh, a Christian town that is still under fire by militant Islamists. We greeted and embraced and wept with many of those who have lost loved ones in the fighting, 66 martyrs for Christ. A poster of these dear saints' pictures and photos on many cell phones illustrated the stories of violence and loss we heard. The day following our visit, shells hit the plaza near where we had parked. There were four casualties.

We were challenged by the resolve of Pastor Ibrahim Nseir from Aleppo who traveled with us for several days. We rejoiced with Elder Najwa and Salam whose houses in Homs have been rebuilt with your help. "Words cannot express," Salam said, "my thanks to God!" We thrilled at the resolve of young people who are committed to rebuilding their nation, both the buildings and the people.

In Lebanon, Iraqi refugees Hala, Ramzieh and Wafa described the incomprehensible horror of being driven with their families from their homes by ISIS near Mosul. Now in Beirut, they spoke with deep gratitude of the trauma healing ministry led by Rola Al Kattar through the Our Lady Dispensary, an Outreach partner. "I choose to forgive!" Hala boldly affirmed.

There are so many other people whom I wish I had space to tell you about. I hope that you will read our team's trip blogs at https://www.theoutreachfoundation.org/trip-blog/ At each of the churches we visited, a team member presented a beautiful banner with these words from Psalm 27: "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? Although not feeling completely comfortable, she obediently registered for the trip to Mozambique and became excited about it. And, it exceeded her expectations. "It was a wonderful, challenging experience," Jane offered. "It deepened my understanding and appreciation for the ministry and its importance to the people there."

Equipped to Make a Difference in Cuba

ife will never be the same for Maricela Muñiz. She will soon graduate from the Matanzas Evangelical Theology Seminary (SET, for its initials in Spanish) in Matanzas, Cuba, where God has transformed and called her to serve him in her native country of Cuba.


Her first touch with the seminary was in grade school. Maricela was brought up in two locally popular religious traditions, Santeria and Spiritism. However, at the age of 12, she attended Sunday School through a program sponsored by SET in her small rural village. It was there that she first came to the realization of God's grace in her life through Jesus Christ. "I realized that God could help me with my difficulties and give me hope," she shared. As she was nurtured and grew in her faith, she began to feel God's call to ministry.

Upon completing high school, she enrolled in the bachelor of theology program at SET. "My understanding of our participation in God's mission has grown tremendously during the three years that I have been here," says Maricela. In her quiet but strong way, she says she feels equipped to make a difference and is confident in her ministry.

Maricela's ministry focus has been the growing youth movement in her denomination. When she completes the program later this year, she will likely return to lead the youth program, focusing on teaching faithful responses

Goats: The Gift that Keeps on Giving

For the past several years, through alternative Christmas giving and Vacation Bible School programs, The Outreach Foundation has helped provide goats for Rwandan families. Goats produce milk for making cheese and yogurt to sell as well as provide meat for families. But, they do so much more and have significant impact on livelihoods. They also manufacture "organic" fertilizer! This fertilizer enhances the families' crop production and vegetable gardens, proving that goats are amazing for economic development. The goats may also be sold to help the families with medical and other expenses.

Through the "goat project," each family is given two goats. As "payment," families team up with others from their church to breed the goats. The first-born kid is then returned to the church to be given to another family in need. At about 30 months, kids are ready to have kids of their own. Most goats have twins and some may even have triplets. Goats improve a community in many ways. They truly are "the gift that keeps on giving!"

2016 Year End Highlights

Thanks be to God, 2016 was a special year for The Outreach Foundation. As we look back, we would like to share several of the highlights:

- Charity Navigator, the nation's foremost charity rating firm, awarded Outreach with a perfect score. Only 55 of 8,000+ charities achieved such a score; they also rated us the highest rated charity in the Religious Activities category.
- We were also blessed by visiting brothers and sisters in Christ in 12 countries with 167 Outreach travelers on 20 total trips. We prayed, worshipped, laughed and cried with friends in Egypt, Mozambique, South Korea, Lebanon, Syria, South Sudan, Ethiopia, Cuba, China, Kenya, Guatemala and Costa Rica.
- Generous partners in the U.S. purchased 26+ goats for Rwandans, helped buy school supplies for refugee children and provided supplemental support for seminary students and their families as alternative Christmas gifts.
- Through your generosity, life-giving relief efforts in Iraq and Syria were aided by gifts in excess of \$565,000, and compassionate donors continue to support these efforts.
- Again, thanks to your generosity, Outreach enjoyed another record year of gifts that we, in turn, distributed to more than 95 mission partners in 30 countries. For that, we are most grateful. A full accounting will appear in the Spring/Summer issue of *Reaching Out*.
